Woman was murdered in Neshoba: SO

Two suspects have been denied bond after they were arrested last week in connection with the murder of two women last month, one of

authorities said. Austin Harrell, 27, and Shaunna Reynolds, 31, both of

them in Neshoba County, the

Newton County, were charged here with the murder of 26year-old Breanna Strickland in Neshoba County.

Another woman, 21-year-old Kaitlyn Goolsby, was murdered in Newton County, the authorities said. Their bodies were dumped off a road not far from the Conehatta community in Newton County.

The investigation started on

March 4 when the bodies were found. Clark said the two were arrested in Newton on March

Both Harrell and Reynolds were served arrest warrants and appeared before Neshoba County Justice Court for an initial appearance on March 18. Bond was denied for both suspects and they remain in custody in Newton County.

"I echo Sheriff Joedy Pennington's statement from earlier today which praised the coordinated efforts of local law enforcement agencies," Clark said of the multi-agency investigation.

"This investigation spread over multiple jurisdictions, which shows proof of how blessed we are in the field of police protection."

Clark said that the pair took the life of Strickland in Neshoba County on Feb. 25, while traveling on Highway 21 south. Clark said that they were reportedly headed to Scott County.

Clark said that authorities are still conducting interviews but they believe the murders were "planned" and that the

Fundraising gala

Philadelphia, \$30-million Congress of Country Music showcased

JACKSON - When explaining what is going on with the Congress of Country Music in downtown Philadelphia, Country Music Hall of Famer Marty Stuart went back to the mission statement of his vision.

"... Marty Stuart's Congress of Country Music is the spiritual home of country music — a cathedral where the spirits of country music legends, and the fires of today's creative souls, converge," he said.

Stuart, a Philadelphia native, had the attention of Mississippi's political and business elite as they gathered here at the Westin Hotel downtown for "An Evening with Marty Stuart and the Congress of Country Music."

Going in, Stuart said he wanted to put not only Philadelphia but country music on the forefront. He did.

"Mississippi is the birthplace of America's music. Blues, rock-n-roll and country music," Stuart said. "Country music is a way of life for me. I live it, Love it.

"In Philadelphia, we are building the Congress of Country Music, a center dedicated to the preservation of traditional country music. For years, I have been on this self-appointed mission to collect the lost, the forgotten, discarded pieces of this part of Ameri-

can history. I travel the land getting to know colorful country music fans and rescuing lost treasures.'

Stuart spent the first hour of the gala working the room, talking with his guests. Getting to know them. There was a dinner. Afterward, he put on a concert, joined by his wife, Connie Smith, and members of his band.

Speaker of the House Philip Gunn

summed it up. "I am excited about this. I have been able to talk to Marty multiple times and have seen some of the items he has," Gunn said. "I am glad to be here tonight and to offer my support. I am very much for this project. A few years back, we appropriated some money for the project."

Former Gov. Haley Barbour, who hosted the gala, reflected on music

history in Mississippi. "A lot of us think about where we lead in music," said Barbour. "Rhythm and Blues, nobody questions that it started in the Mississippi Delta. Rock-n-roll is a little more diverse but there is no question who the king of rock-n-roll is.

"Country music – we think of the Tennessee mountains but it started in Meridian with Jimmie Rodgers. Guys like Marty Stuart have kept it alive and beyond that. They have spread the Mississippi Country Music emblem of over the country and really

all over the world," Barbour said. During his address to the crowd, Barbour pointed out the \$30 million project is more than an idea on the drawing board.

"Construction is underway," Barbour said. "They are spending \$4 million on the first phase which is sup-

posed to open this fall." Located on the south corner of Byrd Avenue and Main Street, when completed, the Congress of Country Music will feature a renovated Ellis Theater along with a museum to display Stuart's 20,000-plus piece collection of country music memorabilia. There will also be classrooms, a community hall, event space and a rooftop performance venue.

While working with local school

Sheriff asks for new cars, **Tasers**

Supervisors have approved more than \$160,000 in new equipment for the Sheriff's Office that includes new Tasers and patrol vehicles.

Neshoba County Sheriff Eric Clark submitted proposals to the Board of Supervisors for new Tasers and three new police interceptor SUVs at the meeting on Monday. Clark said that his office has

built momentum since he took over about three years ago but that new equipment is needed to continue to move forward. "The department has contin-

ued to improve since I got here but we cannot be satisfied with where we are at," Clark said. He noted that his officers

currently have Tasers that are "deteriorating" and they are not able to upkeep.

Concerning the vehicles, Clark said he had a patrol vehicle die on an officer this weekend when he went home on his lunch break. He said that the vehicle was towed and that another vehicle was available but that meant the new vehicle would be in service seven days a week while the other vehicle was in the shop. "Excessive wear can instant-

ly be life threatening in police patrol, due to cars dependency of aged sensors that are in control of steering, breaking and traction," Clark said.

The total request is \$120,000 for the police interceptor SUV's and \$43,200 for the 12-X7 Tasers.

The board decided to bid for a less expensive version of the 12-X7 Tasers and Clark agreed as long as they were comparable to the 12-X7 Tasers.

Clark said that the vehicles will still have to undergo the bid process but that he hoped to be able to cover the cost of the Tasers through a forfeited weapons sale that ended on Monday.

Clark said he did not yet know how much the sale had made. The sale featured more than 75 fire arms that had been seized, forfeited or otherwise unclaimed over the years.

Clark said he is pleased to see the board move forward on these items but had noted that this was his third time asking for the proposed items.

Clark prepared a letter stating his previous request made back in July 2021 and his most recent request in January 2022.

Clark reminded supervisors in the letter that state law says the Sheriff may request funds needed for the operations of the Sheriff's Office annually.

City set to discuss medical marijuana vote

Philadelphia alderman plan to discuss the new medical marijuana law at their first meeting in April.

The Mississippi Medical Cannabis Act went into effect on Feb. 2 and municipalities have 90 days after that date to

Last week the board received information on the news law from the city attorney.

"The bill, which passed Feb. 2, contains wording that says every municipality and county, individually, may within 90 days of passage, either vote to accept it or not

opt-out of the act in whole or in parts. to have it," City Attorney Robert Thomas said last Tuesday during a regular meeting.

In Madison County, Ridgeland Mayor Gene F. McGee said that opting out gave the city time to see what happens in places that do opt-in and noted that it would take longer than they had for the deadline to opt-in or out to draft proper

zoning amendments concerning the medical marijuana industry.

In nearby Gluckstadt, two medical cannabis companies are teaming up to gather the 700 or so signatures needed to force a vote to overturn the city's decision this month to

opt-out of medical marijuana. Madison County Sheriff resident, spoke to the medical marijuana issue before Gluck-

stadt's 3-2 vote to opt out. "Everyone knew this was coming, but I'm not here to speak for or against it," Tucker said. "We have 120 days as a city to opt-out or participate in the medical marijuana program. When you talk about

Randy Tucker, a Gluckstadt enforcement regarding this, there's a big handicap for law enforcement. It won't change any DUI laws of that nature, but in other areas like Oklahoma, there were additional crimes and side effects from the marijuana industry. There is a black market that will continue even if medical cannabis is legalized."

Aldermen approve \$900K airport lighting project

Aldermen approved a \$900,000 project to improve the runway lighting at the Philadelphia Municipal Air-

port last week. The project is 95-percent reimbursable from the FAA, said Will Pentecost, PE, at Allen Engineering, during his presentation to the board.

The project would include

replacing all of the runway, taxiways and apron lights with LED lighting, while installing new wiring and cabinets, new circuits and regulators.

"You currently have 20-year-old system," Pentecost said. "That system has been there since the runway was extended in the early 2000s."

Allen Engineering's contract has two phases. The first phase will be for survey and design work and coming up paid \$42,750 for phase one

with a budget. The second part will be the contract and construction phase. They will put the contract out for bids, determine the lowest and best bid, and make recommendations for the board to approve. Afterwards, they will monitor work on the project until it is

Allen Engineering is be paid \$79,750 which is part of and \$37,000 for phase two. In a separate matter, before approving the board minutes from the pervious meeting, the board withdrew the nomination of Kimbel Wilson to the

Philadelphia School Board. The matter had been approved at the March 8 meeting. It was learned that Mrs. Wilson's husband works for the district, making her ineligible to serve due to a poten-

tial conflict of interest.

Aldermen then passed the March 8 minutes. Robert Beck II was the nominated by Alderman James Tatum and appointed.

In another matter, aldermen were updated about the progress for removing a dilapidated house on Kelly Street. They also discussed properties on Water Avenue, and two more Evergreen Avenue.

In other matters: • Aldermen were informed the bidding process for work on the canal west of the Depot between Main and Beacon streets will be restarted.

• Approved the termination of an employee in the ceme-








She had attempted to escape in February. Barton is described as a

32-year-old white female

who is approximately 5 feet

and 8 inches tall, Neshoba County Sheriff Eric Clark said.

She was being held on an indictment for possession of methamphetamine and pending felony possession of controlled substance and felony escape charges in Neshoba County.

"It appears that Barton was able to escape through two locked perimeter cell doors to gain access to the roof of the jail," Clark said."She maneuvered her way to an access point that didn't contain razor wire and jumped to freedom."

She was last seen wearing

gray sweatshirt, orange pants and top. The most recent sighting in the community advised that she has removed the orange pants and was covered with a shirt that was tied around her waist.

Candace On Feb. 4, Clark said Barton jail officers caught Barattempting ton

"Some jail staff had to pull her out of the concertina wire on the fence," Clark said at the time. "She wound up with extensive damage to both hands and had to be stitched

She has been arrested on Feb. 1, at her residents in the Lynwood Community with a felony amount of meth in her possession.

Clark said they found her hiding in a closet after her boyfriend let them search the premises when deputies arrived to bring Barton in on a recent indictment.

Barton was indicted for felony possession of meth. Clark said she was arrested on that charge in June of last year in the McDonald com-

two killed Goolsby around the same time on Feb. 25.

Clark said that on Tuesday, March 15, 2022, investigators discovered evidence that expanded the Newton County murder investigation to Neshoba County.

Neshoba County Sheriff's Office, Mississippi Bureau of Investigations and Newton Sheriff's Office started a coordinated effort to validate the

information collected, Clark

"Over the course of the next three days, local officers worked tirelessly gathering evidence to support the new information," Clark said.


The 8th District Attorney's

Office provided needed legal guidance to assure a strong legal case, he said.

On March 18, shortly after the pair was arrested, Newton County Sheriff Joedy Pennington said his department and the MBI had formally charged Harrell and Reynolds with the murders.

Pennington said this was a group effort involving the FBI, Mississippi Bureau of Investigation, Choctaw Police, Scott County, Lauderdale County, Neshoba County, Leake County, Winston County, Sebastopol Police, Union

"Thank you Sheriff Eric Clark for working side-byside with my department in this investigation," Pennington said. "Our goal from day one was to bring justice for the two victims and their families and to find the ones responsible."

Partitioning Ukraine

"It's time to meet, time to talk ... time to restore territorial integrity ... for Ukraine," said President Volodymyr Zelenskyy on Saturday.

Zelenskyy added that the need to negotiate was even greater for Moscow. "Otherwise, Russia's losses will be so huge that several generations will not be enough rebound.'

According to the Pentagon, Russia has lost 7,000 soldiers: Kyiv puts the figure at 14,000 dead.

Still, Russian President Vladimir Putin appears less pressured to meet and talk. What does this tell us?

Zelenskyy does not believe

further fighting will benefit Ukraine as much as it will cost his country. And he wants the war over. As for Putin, as Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin said

Sunday, "He's not been able to achieve the goals that he wants to achieve as rapidly as he wants to achieve them." Putin wants more time. The Russian president

began the invasion of Ukraine with Crimea already annexed and the enclaves of Luhansk and Donetsk having already declared their independence of

Since the invasion began, however, Putin's forces have besieged but not taken Ukraine's capital, Kyiv, or second largest city, Kharkiv.

Yet, Russian troops are now in Mariupol on the Sea of Azov, having completed a land bridge from Russia through the Donbas to Crimea and, from there, halfway to Odessa, the last major Ukrainian port on the Black Sea.

While the Ukrainian army and citizens have put up fiercer resistance than was anticipated in Moscow, Russia is not losing this war.

Measured by territorial gains, Putin is winning

He has not captured Kyiv or Kharkiv, but he has expanded the Russian-controlled territories of Donetsk, Luhansk and Crimea that he had at the start of his invasion.

While Russia's costs and

No political solution appears more likely than a new partition of Ukraine.

casualties have been far greater than was anticipated, Putin has added to the Ukrainian lands he held when the war began. And Mother Russia has not lost an inch of land in this war.

"How does this thing end?" Gen. David Petraeus famously asked on the road to Baghdad.

No political solution appears more likely than a new partition of Ukraine, with lands east of the Dnieper River and along the coasts of the Sea of Azov and the Black Sea being ceded to Moscow, and the west of Ukraine being declared a neutral nation like Austria or

Finland in the Cold War. The problem with this probable outcome is that Zelenskyy has ruled out any territorial concessions or land transfers from Ukraine to Russia. And he seeks to "restore," not to make permanent, the 2014 amputations of Crimea and the Donbas.

The dilemma: Zelenskyy probably cannot survive ceding control of any Ukrainian land to Russia. And Putin probably cannot survive a failure in peace talks to expand the Ukrainian holdings with which he began the war.

The "territorial integrity" of Ukraine is the crucial issue in ending this war.

And it is precisely here where it appears impossible for both sides to come to terms.

The one issue on which both parties will likely agree in any peace settlement is the issue that should have been agreed to - to prevent the war: a formal declaration by Kyiv that it will never join a NATO alliance created to contain Russia and, if necessary, defeat Russia in a war.

A frustrated and enraged President Joe Biden has taken to calling Putin a "killer," a "murderous dictator" and a 'war criminal" who has launched an "immoral war" comments the Kremlin calls "unforgivable"

Such rhetoric would seem to rule out any role for U.S. diplomacy in negotiating the end to this war. Other nations Israel, Turkey, France, Germany — have maintained regular relations and constant contact with Putin, who sits and broods atop the world's largest nuclear arsenal.

Consider the moral dilemma the U.S. has put itself in.

Our president says Russia is led by "a war criminal," conducting an "immoral" war in which deliberate atrocities are committed at hospitals, schools, kindergartens and art theaters.

Yet, the U.S. and NATO will not provide weapons to Ukraine, including secondhand MiGs, that might cause Russia to retaliate against us or NATO or risk World War III or risk Russia's use of tactical atomic weapons.

Because, pillaged and persecuted though Ukraine may be, it is not a member of

If Latvia, however, with 5% of Ukraine's population, is encroached upon, we will engage Russia militarily, and to hell with the risk of World War III or Russia's possible retaliation with atomic weapons.

In war, the moral is to the material as three is to one, said Napoleon. Unfortunately, what George Bernard Shaw said cynically also appears to be true: In war, God is on the side of the big battalions.

Zelenskyy probably cannot survive signing away the title to any Ukrainian land, be it Crimea or the Donbas. And Putin likely cannot survive not bringing home new territory from a Russian "victory."

Again, perhaps the one issue on which almost all now agree is that Ukraine renounce its right to join the NATO

DeSantis and the new Republican Party

Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis had another moment that lit up the right, this time pushing back against Disney's critique of the so-called "Don't Say Gay" bill.

In his statement, DeSantis was absolutely stalwart, saying that the chances are "zero" that he's going to back away from his support for the law. And he didn't hesitate to go on offense against Disney. He said it had made a fortune off being family-friendly so should understand that families don't want inappropriate material injected into the curriculum at schools and smacked the company for making money in China without denouncing the brutal practices of the Chinese Communist

Party. DeSantis had been equally forthright a few days earlier, contesting the dishonest "Don't Say Gay" characterization by a reporter at a news conference. "It's why people don't trust people like you," the governor said, "because you peddle fake narratives, and so we disabuse you of those narratives."

This is the voice of the new Republican Party.

Which is not to say that the party wasn't socially conservative before (George W. Bush ran against gay marriage in 2004), or that it didn't criticize the media (one of George H.W. Bush's best moments in 1988 was slamming Dan Rather during a live interview). But there's a new combativeness that is clearly a reflection of how Trump underlined the power of cultural issues and changed the rules around how you deal with controversy by doubling down and hitting

just as inclined to rumble if Donald Trump had never emerged — Chris Christie, for instance, had considerable success with a "bring it on" attitude toward criticisms during his governorship.

What feels new, though, is the zest for combat on cultural issues, as well as a willingness to bring to bear public power to the fight where possible (government has every right to control what is and isn't taught in government schools).

There's also a complete intolerance for playing along with false media narratives.

And, lastly, there's zero hesitation to stand up to corporations siding with the left in policy disputes. It seemed several years ago in the debates over religious-freedom restorations acts at the state level that corporations held the whip hand over state officials. Not anymore. Not after Republicans have learned that the appropriate response to such pressure is, No. Hell, no."

If this new approach draws on Trump, it should vitiate one of the arguments long made for Trump: "At least he fights." Now, the party is full of people who want to fight in a broadly similar fashion — however, with important differences from Trump. In the "Don't Say Gay" con-

troversy, DeSantis isn't relitigating what happened in the last election; he is freshly litigating a defense against a cutting-edge progressive cause.

He isn't defending the indefensible; he's defending the eminently defensible, in fact the unfairly maligned.

He isn't dragging anyone through a fight occasioned by his personal failings or dubious practices; he's standing up for a well-considered conservative initiative.

And he isn't jousting with reporters who know more about the contested topic than he does; no, on this and pretty much everything else, he knows more than any of his antagonists.

So, DeSantis opens up a vista offering an important element of Trumpism without the baggage or selfishness of Trump.

The same can be said of Arkansas Sen. Tom Cotton. He gave a speech the other day at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library that thoughtfully inte-Trumpian populist themes with traditional GOP thinking.

Here is another vista, of a policy vision with a strong element of Trumpism that might have broad appeal to GOP voters of all stripes without the distracting obsessions of the former president.

This gets at what could be one of the most persuasive arguments to Republican voters for Trump not running again not that he needs to go away so the old party can be restored, but that he's unnecessary because a new party has emerged.

Other participating schools included Union, Forest, Scott Central, Newton County, Morton, Lake, Leake Central, Hawkins Middle, Philadelphia.

Becky Spears, a fourthgrade Gifted Teacher at Neshoba Elementary School, said Neshoba hosted the chess portion of the ECTAG program this year and said all the students were very excited to play, especially the second graders.

"We weren't able to take part in the chess competition last year due to the pandemic, Spears said. "We usually hold the competition at our school, but since our building is under some renovations, we had to move the competition to Trinity Baptist Church. We had table after table set up with chess boards and the kids were amazed to see how many there were. These students enjoy chess a lot."

Logan Spears, a fifth-grade gifted student at Neshoba Central in the IIC Division, said he really enjoyed being able to compete in competition since he was not able to

"This year, I played one student who created his own Chess team and competes in chess competitions across the state," he said. "I thought that was really cool, and playing that game was definitely a challenge. Overall, it was a great day, and I'm glad my team won second place.'

The East Central Talented and Gifted Association was formed to give all gifted stu-

dents in the area an opportunity to compete in various competitions in a wholesome learning environment with other gifted students, Spears said.

"This year we had a smaller group," Spears said. "Each team usually has five students, but we limited it to three per grade this year. We rank these students from first place through third place and set it up to where all of our topranked students would play against other top ranks of the same grade so it would be an even playing field. Second graders played against second graders and so on.'

She said holding the competition at Trinity Baptist Church was different due to it being off campus, and the students are used to coming to the school for it.

"The students were just happy to be able to have their competition and get together," Spears said. "Our students are gifted, but they have to face off against other top ranks. They may be the best at our schools, but when they play top-ranked students from other schools, it's interesting to see that play out."

Noah Parker, a fourthgrade gifted student at Neshoba Central in Division IA, said the most challenging part of going to the competition was the playoffs at school to decide the top players.

"When I got to the competition, the players I competed against were really good," Parker said. "In two of my games, I tied at the end of our

30-minute time limit and had to have a 15-minute playoff. It was a tough, but good day."

Katie Goss, second through fourth grade teacher at Union, said her students worked very hard to prepare and learned a lot about thinking skills and

"Taking part in the competition excited my students and pushed them to do better next year," Goss said. "Some of them watch chess videos at home and check out books on chess to read so they can learn to do better."

Katie Monday, second through sixth-grade teacher at Philadelphia Elementary School, supervised Division IIB and said her students' biggest challenge was gaining new strategies.

"They definitely had a hard time inventing new strategies to play chess," Monday said.
"They did well though and I am very proud of all their hard work. Ĭ ĥad one student, Talia Cole, who won all her games and a Chess Master ribbon!"



went to Corinth." Paul entered Corinth alone as he did in Athens. Corinth was a port city and thriving commercial center, much larger than Athens. Corinth was known for its worldliness, sporting events, and sexual immorality. Whereas Athens' main temple was to the goddess of wisdom (Athena), Corinth had a massive temple to Aphrodite, the goddess of love. The temple had thousands of male and female prostitutes.

Paul finds a Jewish couple, Aquila and Priscilla, who had become Christians before moving to Corinth. They had in common with Paul the tent making trade, so Paul began working with them and then preaching in the Jewish synagogue on the Sabbath.

In verse 5 we see that Silas and Timothy arrive from Macedonia, apparently with funds, because Paul began to devote his time to "testifying to the Jews that the Christ was Jesus." The Jews opposed and reviled Paul to such an extent he declares himself "innocent of their blood" and announces he is going to the Gentiles while in Corinth.

So Paul moves his base of operation from the synagogue to the house of a believer, Titius Justice, whose house happened to be next door to the synagogue (verse 7)! Undoubtedly the unconverted Jews were angered by Paul's ongoing ministry right next door, and their opposition must have weakened Paul because the Lord appears to Paul in a vision and tells him not to fear but to keep on speaking (verses 9-10). Paul ends up staying in Corinth for 18 months (verse 11). And his ministry bore fruit; "many believed."

The second question of the Heidelberg Catechism asks how may I live and die in the joy and comfort of Christ. The answer is three things I must know: 1) How great my sin and misery are. 2) How I am set free from all my sins and misery. 3) How I am to thank God for such deliverance.

The Jewish resistance to the gospel in Corinth is a demonstration of how great and miserable sin is. Their revulsion to the gospel was so strong that Paul "shook out his garments and said to them, 'Your blood be on your own heads! I am innocent" (verse 6). In other words, he had warned

Acts 18:1 begins, "Paul left Athens and them of the guilt of their sin and the judgment of God against them. He was not responsible for their doom.

> The Jews in Corinth would have hated being likened to the sinful Corinthian Gentiles. For a list of sins prevalent in Corinthian culture, you can read First Corinthians chapter 6. It is true not all of these things are done by every sinful man, but the same root of sin is in us all. That root at its core is opposed to God, and from it springs all manner of evil. We cannot extract this root but God can.

Resisting the truth of what God says about our sinful hearts will cause, if not a public display like the Corinthian Jews, private indignation. Sin makes man so obstinate that he will not be saved from it, but he will be damned rather than turn to God. Such is the misery of sin.

Sin leads to death. Scripture teaches us death is not a normal process, but that death is punishment. It is the wages of sin. It is an expression of God's wrath, his judgment against the sinner. But God in his mercy provides a Savior suitable for our case.

Christ came into the world to enter into death. His death was voluntary in obedience to the Father. We see that Jesus shrank from it (John 12, Matthew 26). He knew it was an expression of God's wrath, the execution of justice against the workers of iniquity. But in all his suffering and agony on the cross, he never became disobedient. His dying was an act of perfect obedience in the love of God.

He himself never sinned, but he came to represent his people so he must bear the wrath for their sins. So he agreed with the sentence of death, that he was worthy of death. The Lord laid upon him the iniquity of us all. It is only in Christ's death we can be absolved from guilt of sin, and be reconciled to God. None who resist him will be accepted by God.

We must agree with the sentence of death also, that we are worthy of it, and that our hope is built on nothing less than Jesus blood and righteousness. It is a great salvation. Jesus said, 'the words I speak to you are of spirit and life, come unto me and I will give you rest."


